



Turn off your sprinkler systems

It's important to turn your sprinkler system off to not only prevent burst pipes, but also to protect sidewalks and roads from accumulating ice. Current forecasts show weather conditions to be likely to cause hazardous travel - no need to add to that by unknowingly running your sprinkler system!



Disconnect your garden hoses

Now is a good time to disconnect your garden hoses from outdoor spigots. Water expands when it freezes, so taking this precaution lessens the risk of your pipes freezing and bursting. Even homeowners with "frost-free" spigots should still remove hoses during the winter for the utmost protection.



Cover your outdoor faucets

Faucet covers work by trapping heat that naturally radiates through the interior pipes to the outdoor spigot. By trapping the heat, the insulated cover helps prevent water in the faucet from freezing, expanding, and rupturing the spigot. Outdoor faucet covers come in several different styles and can be found in most home goods stores.



Protect vulnerable outdoor plants

When a deep freeze is expected like this week, first cover your plants with sheets or blankets and then cover with plastic to help keep warmth in. Never cover a plant with just plastic, however, as the plastic will damage the plant. Make sure that a cloth barrier is between the plastic and the plant, and remember to remove as soon as the temps start to rise above freezing.



Protect people and pets

In addition to the first four tips for property, it's also very important to check-in on elderly neighbors, family and anyone you know that may be vulnerable in these wintery conditions. And don't forget to bring in outdoor pets or provide a warm cover to protect them from the cold temperatures.


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Follow the National Weather Service - Fort Worth/Dallas
